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Studied biology and experimental psychology at Cambridge and was awarded a D.Phil. from Oxford University in 1963 for a thesis on the temporal structure of conversation. He has undertaken research work on face-to-face interaction and gestural communication at Oxford University, University of Pittsburgh, Bronx State Hospital, New York, Australian National University and Indiana University. He has taught at Cornell University, Connecticut College and the University of Pennsylvania. He is the author of numerous papers on the micro-structure of face-to-face interaction and on the nature of gesture and its relationship with spoken language. He recently published a book entitled Sign Languages of Aboriginal Australia (Cambridge University Press, 1988), which includes the results of original field work with Australian Aborigines undertaken between 1978 and 1986.
